

Flagship Programme: Pathways to a Degree

Context and background

Cardiff University's Division of Lifelong Learning (LEARN) exists to provide, support and facilitate high-quality, accessible, affordable and flexible higher education (HE) for a diverse range of adult learners and communities.

LEARN's flagship programme, Pathways to a Degree, offers supportive part-time routes to degree study at Cardiff University. The aim of the Progamme is to widen access to HE for adults who might not normally consider applying to university: learners from socially and economically deprived backgrounds, those who missed the chance to study at university when they were younger and those disadvantaged by physical disabilities and/or mental health conditions. LEARN typically recruits students from disadvantaged areas¹ and those from the University's priority groups for widening access: care leavers, carers, veterans, estranged young people, refugees and asylum seekers.

Pathways

Each Pathways consist of 60 credits of Level 4 modules and have been developed and introduced in partnership with individual academic schools. Currently there are 13 Pathways on offer.

Cardiff University's commitment to to Lifelong Learning is steeped in its history and the longevity and success of the Pathways to a Degree programme is testament to this commitment.

¹ This is based on postcode according to the Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation (WIMD); most learners are from quintiles 1 and 2, representing the 40% most disadvantaged areas within Wales

The LEARN Community and Outreach Team works with various community organisations who signpost Pathway courses to their clients.

Promotion and recruitment from these groups has been successful as shown in Table 1 for the 2024-25 year.

Support for pathways students

LEARN provides bespoke academic and pastoral support for Pathways students, which includes:

- → Pre-enrolment academic guidance
- → Advice on module selection
- → A dedicated Pathways Induction event
- → Guidance on students' applications for funding from Student Finance Wales
- → Ongoing support for applications to university via UCAS, including personal statement support and references
- → Pastoral support from experienced adult education tutors, the Pathways Coordinator, and relevant Co-ordinating Lecturers
- → Mature Students' Induction event post-Pathway (led by LEARN and the WP team and open to all mature students at the University)

² Asylum seekers are recorded twice as they are a priority group for Cardiff University and are eligible for University scholarships (refugees are not)

Student success

Student numbers on our Pathways have remained healthy despite the cost of living crisis and the impact of the pandemic. In 2023-24 61 students completed Pathways to a Degree and 381 Pathways students have progressed to undergraduate courses at Cardiff University since 2012. For students who have completed their degrees, retention and completion rates are notably strong: 94% completion rate for ex-Pathways students for degrees in the School of Healthcare, 89% in the School of History, Archaeology and Religion, and 86% in the School of Social Sciences.. Within Healthcare, around 73% of students achieve either a first-class or upper second-class degree.

The Pathways to a Degree programme creates successful learning communities for underrepresented learners and provides individuals with the opportunity to access part-time routes into HE.
